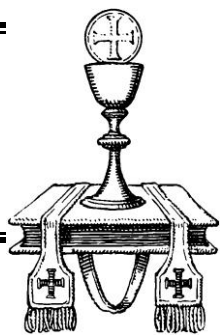

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,
This weekend (September 26th) we honor Saint Jean de Brébeuf (1583-1649), one of eight Jesuit Missionaries who missioned in the new world. Saint Jean missioned mainly among the Huron tribes. He first arrived in Quebec the Summer of 1625 along with Fathers Charles Lalemant and Énemond Massé. A missionary among the Hurons for over 20 years.

Saint Jean knew if he were to win over the hearts of the Huron to Christ, he must assume their way of life (similar to the purpose of Christ's Incarnation among us in order to win us over back to the love of God the Father). He would often join them on their travels, usually carrying the heavier load - earning him both the esteem of the people and the nickname "great oak". Saint Jean also dedicated himself tirelessly to learn the Huron language; translating much of the Catechism, many prayers, and biblical passages from French into Huron, also arranging for them the first print in their language.

Saint Jean was later captured by the Iroquois and tortured to martyrdom. Among one of the tortures - in mockery of Baptism - they boiled pots of water and poured them over his head three times (for the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit). And after seeing him withstand so many terrible tortures and remaining firm in his faith, they finally ripped out and ate his heart wishing in some way to have some of his courage.

Despite it being a Sunday, in a special way we honor Saint Jean de Brébeuf for the seed of faith he has left us, the seed of faith he has planted in this country for us.

GOSPEL of Sunday Sept. 26 Mark 9.38-43, 45, 47-48

After Jesus had finished teaching the disciples, John said to him, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us."

"For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward."

"If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea."

"If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched."
