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## PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

As we now enter into this Season of Ordinary Time, and as we consider Jesus' day-to-day life. I thought it may be convenient for us to consider a virtue a week! Because one of the reasons for considering Jesus' day-to-day life in Jerusalem is for us to consider our day-to-day life here in Peterborough.

We can first ask ourselves, 'what exactly is a virtue?' Aristotle – the great Greek philosopher - defines virtue as "a habit that makes a person good and his works good." This is why when we typically talk about a good person we would often say, 'That does sound like something *so-an-so* would do' or '*so-*

*an-so* would probably help you with that.' A person is considered virtuous because they have the tendency to do the virtuous things. Virtues also have the tendency to web out, that is when we practice of one virtue it usually leads us to practice another virtue.

Aristotle again adds to his definition of virtue as "a disposition to behave in the right manner and as a medium between extremes of excess and defect (*which are both vices*)." This perfect medium we call the 'Golden Mean'. **For example:** Courage is the virtue – the golden mean - between cowardice (*defect*) and reckless (*excess*). Or temperance is the golden mean between insensible and self-indulgent. Or cautious the golden mean between scrupulous and inconsiderate.

The first effort of becoming virtuous is the desire to be virtuous. We must first identify the reason for acquiring a virtue – our future incentive is to be with God in heaven and our current incentive is to find peace in our soul. No one becomes virtuous with doing something good only one time, we must have (1) repetition and (2) delight. Repetition so that we may have that common disposition to do the good. And delight to joy in the virtue, otherwise we would never do it again; otherwise, there is no incentive for its repetition and no desire for possessing and keeping the virtue. Let us keep to heart these words from the gospel of Luke, "Jesus grew in wisdom and in stature" (Luke 2:52).

## GOSPEL John 2.1-12 of Sunday Jan. 16, 2022

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding.

When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding about a hundred litres. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it.

When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now."

Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him. After this he went down to Capernaum with his mother, his brothers, and his disciples; and they remained there a few days.
