PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

Throughout this entire season of lent we have been preparing ourselves for the most sacred of events – the Holy Triduum, which approaches us in only two weeks time. The Holy Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil or Resurrection Sunday), celebrates the whole mystery of our Redemption (last supper, passion, death and Resurrection). The word 'Triduum' comes from two Latin words 'tres' (three) and 'dies' (day) which means the 'three day' celebration.

The Holy Triduum is really one prolonged Mass. What we celebrate and remember every Sunday in the span of only an hour, we now take

three days to consider more profoundly. The mysteries contained in the Mass are inexhaustible, therefore it is only proper to take three days to relive this mystery of our Salvation.

Interestingly enough, in every Mass the priest starts with the sign of the cross and ends with the sign of the cross. In the Holy Triduum, Holy Thursday starts with the sign of the cross, but does not end with the sign of the cross. On Good Friday, the priest neither starts nor ends with the sign of the cross until the Easter Vigil when he ends with the final blessing. This small gesture reminds us the Holy Triduum is one long Mass.

A quote from the Roman Missal reminds us, "Christ redeemed us all and gave perfect glory to God principally through His paschal mystery: dying He destroyed death and rising He restored our life. Therefore, the Easter Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord is the culmination of the entire liturgical year. Thus, the solemnity of Easter has the same kind of pre-eminence in the Liturgical year that Sunday has in the week...these days are therefore unique in the liturgical year and their celebration is of the utmost importance in the spiritual and pastoral life of the Church."

Thus, I do highly encourage – *if possible* - to attend these Most Sacred Day; it would of great spiritual benefit and very pleasing in the eyes of God.

GOSPEL John 8.1-11 of Sunday April 3

Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them.

The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before the people, they said to Jesus, "Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. In the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?" They said this to test Jesus, so that they might have some charge to bring against him.

Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. When the scribes and Pharisees kept on questioning him, Jesus straightened up and said to them, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." And once again Jesus bent down and wrote on the ground.

When the scribes and Pharisees heard what Jesus had said, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him.

Jesus straightened up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" She said, "No one, sir." And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again."
